Course Request Process

- Course Selection sheets were given to your students today
- Core Course Recommendation Levels (Regular or Honors) will be given to your students at the end of this week or early next week.
 - Core classes are in: English, Math, Science, and Social Studies.
 - If your student wishes to take an honors level course they will need to fill out a waiver with their signature, a parent signature, and a signature from the recommending teacher for that particular course.
 - Waivers are available in homerooms or from Mrs. Cote.
- HS School Counselor's and Mrs. Cote will meet with students on March 9th and March 10th during the school day to register for classes on Xello.



Course Request FAQs

- Are students making their schedules for next year?
 - No, just requesting courses. Student choices will determine what classes make it into the master schedule. Power School will then build schedules based on all the course requests.
- Will every course listed be offered?
 - Probably not. A few courses might not run because of under-enrollment, scheduling issues, and/or budgetary constraints. That's why students are asked to choose an additional 2 credits of alternative classes.
- How many classes should be requested?
 - ALL students will request 8 credits worth of classes
 PLUS
 - 2 credits of Alternates in case a first-choice class is not offered.



What is a CREDIT?

Credits are earned when a high school course is passed.

The amount of credits is based on the the length of the class:

- 1 credit for a semester
- ½ credit for a quarter
- 2 credits for a year

A minimum of **26 credits** are required for graduation.

A student can earn **32 credits** in four years if they pass all of their classes each year and have a full 8 credit schedule every year.
